Rooms facing the ocean have unusually good views given the distance, thanks to the tranquil park between you and the water 1/3 mile away. Best views are from the 8th floor and above. Overall, this is probably the best property in the immediate area. Self-parking is \$18. Hotel-type rooms (340 sq. ft.) are \$265–\$275, studios with kitchenette (340 sq. ft.) are \$285–\$295, 1/1s (approx. 500 sq. ft.) are \$385–\$485, 2/2s (approx. 700 sq. ft.) are

\$615. These RACK rates are too high, but most get discounts.

No room safes, but valuables can be stored at the office. BBQ grills, beach mats and chairs available. Basic, very clean, no frills. (They have a pretty little garden, though.) Parking costs \$10 but is limited. At times they give discounts and longer stays get better rates, which would definitely make it a SOLID GOLD VALUE. Studios (287 sq. ft.) are \$110–\$120, 1/1s (333–448 sq. ft.) are \$125–\$150. About 2 blocks to the beach.

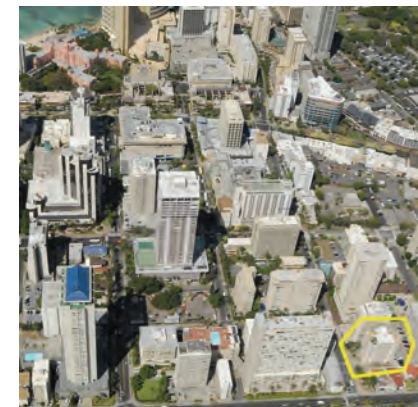

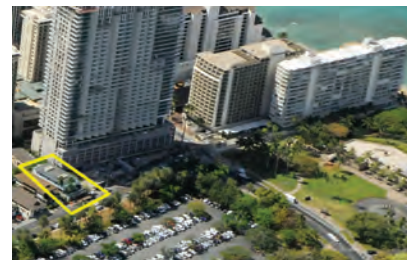

18 rooms and free local calls, no room safes, free Wi-Fi possible from signals nearby. A 3-story (no elevator) 1950s building with no non-smoking rooms. This tiny, family-run resort was looking run-down on our recent visit and without a locking gate to access rooms, there may be some security concerns on this property compared to its neighbors, like Aloha Punawai. We removed the SOLID GOLD VALUE for this edition. The furnishings are old—perhaps the originals in some cases, but with newer slipcovers. You get the feeling it hasn't changed much since it was built—they even have stove-top coffee percolators in rooms. But, hey, you ain't paying for the Halekulani. Parking is \$36 for a 3-day pass at Ft. DeRussy Park across the street. Studios with kitchenettes and two twin beds (approx. 220 sq. ft.) are \$85, 1/1s (approx. 420 sq. ft.) are \$95–\$150 (depending on the number of people in your party). If you want less street noise, ask for a unit at the back of the building. About 2 blocks to the beach. 3-night minimum.
